In addition to offering a sound and well-rounded education, the A. B. degree in Architecture can also provide pre-professional competency for entry-level employment in architecture, for the option of graduate work in architecture, or for further studies in a related environmental design field. The undergraduate degree in Architecture is not a professional degree and is not recognized by the National Architecture Accrediting Board. The Master of Architecture is the only accredited professional degree offered by the department.

Admission to the College of Environmental Design in architecture is competitive. Students who wish to transfer to CED are expected to complete extensive, very specific coursework at the lower division level. Completion of major prerequisites is critical to admission. It will be beneficial for students interested in the Architecture major at UC Berkeley to refer to the articulation agreement at www.assist.org for the latest information.

To be considered for admission, students **must** complete each area listed below. For prerequisites that are not articulated, students may wish to look into taking the courses at UCB during the summer or via University Extension Concurrent Enrollment, if space is available. MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION:

- The UC applicant personal statement is important in the selection process. The College reviews the personal statement for evidence of the student's interest in the chosen field and a thoughtful match between the academic program and the student's academic and career objectives.
- A minimum 3.0 overall UC transferable grade point average is required for admission consideration.
- All courses required for admission, including breadth requirements, must be taken for a letter grade.
- Coursework must be completed by the end of the spring term that precedes fall enrollment at UCB.
- Community College transfers must complete the following design prerequisites, non-design skills, and remaining breadth requirements.

Lower Division Non-Design Breadth Requirements:

The College of Environmental Design will accept IGETC to satisfy the Breadth requirement for students applying in fall 2011 and beyond. The 7-Course Breadth Requirement will continue to be accepted. Note that all CED students may not use CED courses for breadth, even if those courses appear on the breadth list. All courses must be taken for a letter grade and completed by the end of the spring term that precedes fall enrollment at UCB.

1. Courses from Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Visual Studies, Environmental Design, Urban Studies, and City and Regional Planning may NOT be used to fulfill CED's breadth requirements.
2. Community college courses used to satisfy Environmental Design 1, 11A, or 11B (e.g., Art or Architecture courses) may NOT also be used to satisfy breadth requirements.
3. No more than two courses offered by the same department may be used toward the seven breadth requirements.
4. Courses equivalent to the second semester of language instruction at UCB may be used to satisfy the International Studies breadth requirement. However, courses taken in the student's native language do not satisfy the requirement.

Students must take one course or combination from each of the following seven areas. For the Physical Science area, PHYS 40 + 41 are articulated and required. For the other breadth areas, there are a number of approved SRJC courses listed in the articulation agreement for the Architecture major at www.assist.org.

1. ARTS AND LITERATURE
2. BIOLOGICAL SCIENCE
3. HISTORICAL STUDIES
4. INTERNATIONAL STUDIES
5. PHILOSOPHY AND VALUES
6. PHYSICAL SCIENCE: PHYS 40 + 41
7. SOCIAL AND BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES
