It is very difficult for students to prepare for the Architecture major at SRJC as many of the lower division courses required in the major are not available here at this time. Architecture is impacted at Pomona and San Luis Obispo. Some students may want to consider Construction Management or Civil Engineering as an alternate route to becoming architects.

CAL POLY, POMONA – based on 2007-08 Pomona catalog and 2006-07 articulation

The Bachelor of Architecture (B.ARC) program is IMPACTED - applications will only be accepted during the initial filing period (October 1 - November 30) for the following fall quarter. Applicants must be California residents and have a very competitive GPA in transferable coursework.

For fall 2008 admission to Architecture, upper division transfer students must have completed college-level English composition, speech, critical thinking, and math by the end of the fall 2007 term. Spring 2008 enrollment in such courses will not be counted as meeting this requirement. Students are strongly advised to complete the CSU GE requirements and be fully certified prior to transfer. Students must complete 60 semester units of transferable coursework. Successful transfer applicants usually have a minimum GPA of 3.2.

To be eligible the student must have completed a minimum of **6 semester units of ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN COURSES**, as judged by the Architecture Department. Students who are accepted into the program and who, based upon transcript review, are eligible for advanced placement are then asked to submit an 8 1/2" by 11" portfolio of their work so that the Department can determine in which year of study each student should be placed. Experience has shown that most students reviewed for advanced standing are placed in the second year of architectural design, but a sizable number are also placed either in the first year or are required to attend summer school before beginning their second year of design in the fall. To be placed in second year, the student must have completed the following prerequisites: **ENGL 1A and 5 and MATH 58**. **Note:** ART 18.1 taken for at least 2 units is articulated with EN V 120.

To be placed in third year, the student must have extensive architectural design and related coursework and have completed the following prerequisites: **PHYS 2A/3A & 2B/3B; MATH 58; ENGL 1A and 5; and at least one course in the history of architecture must be completed by the end of spring term.** *The courses listed are recommended, but not formally articulated.* Only exceptional students are given third year placement. Review of portfolios occurs only for top ranked students who are being considered for an advanced placement opening on the basis of criteria stated above.

CAL POLY, SAN LUIS OBISPO

Bachelor of Architecture degree program is IMPACTED and accepts applications fall and winter quarters only. Admission of transfer applicants to this major is competitive. For comparative purposes, applications are scored in four separate categories with different weights for each. The four categories are 1) specific coursework for the major, 2) completion of CSU GE or IGETC, 3) GPA, and 4) work experience and extra-curricular activity participation.

To be competitive for admission, students should complete 8 semester units in trig-based physics; 8 semester units in calculus; 1 semester unit in architectural practice; 6 semester units of beginning design and drawing; and 3 semester units in computer applications.

Major Courses: No comparable courses offered at SRJC

Support Courses: **ARCH 70A & 70B; MATH 1A & 1B; PHYS 2A/3A&2B/3B or 40/41**

Suggested Support Courses: **ART 7A** and a computer applications course

Many other lower division major and support courses are required but are not articulated with SRJC courses.

Admission to the Professional Phase in the School of Architecture is selective, and occurs only once a year (in June) for students entering the Professional Phase the following August. Completion of all pre-professional coursework does not assure a student of admission to the professional phase. The philosophy guiding Professional Phase admission is to select those students with the highest potential for success in the program. Final selection is based on cumulative GPA and an exhibition of creative work. The admissions formula slightly favors Arizona residents. Outstanding transfer and previous degree candidates with equivalent academic preparation will also be considered.

You are considered a **transfer applicant** at the University of Arizona if you have completed, at the time you apply, a minimum of 24 transferable semester units and have graduated from high school or earned a high school diploma. If you have completed fewer than 24 transferable units, your application will be processed using freshman application deadlines, criteria, and/or guidelines. Coursework in progress will **not** be used in the review of your application. Applicants must apply to the University Office of Admissions in addition to the School of Architecture. Pre-Professional Coursework: *the following courses are representative only and are not articulated with the University of Arizona. They are provided in order to give prospective students an idea of the content required in the first year of the 5-year professional degree program.*

ART 7A and one additional art studio course
ENGL 1A, 1B
MATH 25 & 58 or 27, 1A
PHYS 2A/3A

Note: Courses with grades of D will not transfer.
