Terry Ehret Nominated Poet Laureate of California

Governor Schwarzenegger is seeking a new state poet laureate, and SRJC's poet instructor Terry Ehret is among the nominees selected from across the state. Currently Sonoma County's poet laureate, Terry has been a creative writing and composition instructor at SRJC since 1990 and is one of the founders of the innovative Sixteen Rivers Press for San Francisco Bay Area poets. She visits classrooms across the country, helps promote the Poetry Tent at the Sonoma County Book Fair, hosted a bilingual Poems of Remembrance reading in celebration of El Dia de los Muertos, launched the online Sonoma County Writers Guide for local writers, is involved in SRJC's Arts and Lectures Series, and has been an enrichment specialist in public elementary schools with the California Poets in the Schools Program.

Terry's most recent book of verse is *Translations from the Human Language*. With numerous published poems, essays, and stories, she is the recipient of various literary awards, including the National Poetry Series, California Commonwealth Club Book Award, Nimrod/Hardman Pablo Neruda Poetry Prize, and three Pushcart Prize nominations.

The California Arts Council and Poet Laureate panel will soon present the top three nominees to the Governor's Office. The entire college community wishes Terry good luck!

Emergency Transport of Disabled With Stair Chairs

SRJC's District Police Department recently adopted a policy on the use of stair chairs on both campuses that will be utilized to safely evacuate disabled students and employees in the event of an emergency.

Should a disaster occur that shuts down the use of elevators, a group of trained SRJC personnel will be available to assist disabled persons by utilizing stair chairs to ensure the safe evacuation from upper to lower building levels.

To enhance the safety of disabled persons during an emergency, SRJC's Emergency Health and Safety Program (EH&S) will conduct training for first responders, including police, custodians, and interested disabled persons during spring.

Once trained, the cadre of trained emergency transport staff will be notified by the District Police in the event of an emergency that requires moving disabled persons from buildings using stairs. For individuals who may need this service, contact the District Police at 527-1000.

PSTC Welcomes Bomberos From Mexico – Ambulances Donated

In late February SRJC's Public Safety Training Center hosted members of the Cabo San Lucas Fire Department known as the Patronatos de Bomberos, a contingency from Mexico visiting our region to receive emergency equipment donated to support relief efforts in Mexico.

In the last five years, the American Medical Response (AMR) donated five ambulances to SRJC, two in October, which are used for training in the Emergency Medical Care (EMC) Program at the PSTC. The AMR also donated three ambulances to the Cabo San Lucas Fire Department. In addition, the Sebastopol Fire Department surplused a fire truck to Cabo San Lucas and the Rohnert Park, Santa Rosa Fire Department, Petaluma Fire Department, and San Antonio Fire Department all donated emergency equipment to the Bomberos.

SRJC's Ken Bradford, Coordinator and Instructor of SRJC's EMC training, has traveled for ten years to Cabo San Lucas to help improve emergency medical care and the fire service that assist local residents and tourists. "The Bomberos are very dedicated people who pour every penny they can scratch up to better their department and help others. I cannot say enough about Commandante Juan Carbajal. He has poured his life's blood in to this project for many years, simply to be rewarded by the personal satisfaction of knowing he is save lives and improving the quality of life in Cabo San Lucas," Ken says. Her supervisor Ron Myers, Interim Athletic Director, Physical Education, Dance & Athletics introduced Jaime at the March 8 Board of Trustees meeting. She received an official EOM plaque, season tickets to SRT, Culinary Café gift vouchers, and other gifts from co-workers and friends. "I am nominating Jaime because of her outstanding work in our department," says Ron. "She is one of the finest and most professional young people I have been associated with. Jaime is as deserving of this award as anybody I have been associated with in my 25 years at SRJC."

Administrative Assistant III in the Physical Education, Dance & Athletics (PEDA) Department Therese Jennings states that it is "Jaime's strong sense of responsibility that gives her a passion for doing the best possible job, producing the best possible products, and providing the best possible service." To Jaime's co-workers she has endeared herself to the department because of her strong work ethic, pleasing disposition, intelligence, and creativity.
