Health Benefits Committee Needs Your Input!

SRJC's Fringe Benefits Committee continues to work on the college's medical benefits issues.

The Challenges – The College has been experiencing extreme growth in the cost of health insurance. For example, last year the cost increase for health insurance was equal approximately to a two percent salary COLA for the entire College. This year, unless a better alternative can be found, the increase will be nearly 35 percent, almost the cost of a three percent salary COLA for all employees, a rate of increase that is not sustainable.

Bad experience statistics are an additional problem. As a whole, SRJC employees are older. As we age our health-care costs increase because we experience more sickness. Over the past several years we have seen a significant increase in the number of individuals with serious illnesses. This development, in addition to general cost escalation, is what has pushed up our premiums.

With the advice of the Fringe Benefits Committee and the two collective bargaining groups, SRJC's administration is negotiating a consulting contract with health benefits consultant Rael & Letson to identify cost-effective alternatives.

Decision Point Coming In March - While any change in coverage would not take effect until July 1, SRJC employees will have an opportunity to express their opinions at the time new collective bargaining agreements are decided upon. During the next couple of months, the Fringe Benefits Committee will provide informational updates to the college community about the progress of identifying the most feasible, cost-effective medical coverage options.

Feb 3 Enrollment Enhancement Forum A Success!

At last week's Friday February 3 Enrollment Enhancement Forum, there were over 130 SRJC faculty and staff members in attendance. Participants came prepared to learn and share ideas. Chuck Robbins and Kerry Campbell-Price presented information about SRJC's changing demographics and student population, and Janet McCulloch, Kimberlee Messina, Deborah Sweitzer, John Daly, Kris Abrahamson, and Chuck Robbins (again) facilitated the discussions and recorded participants' comments.

Next steps: Co-sponsors will review audience feedback and comments, group them into ideas and more discussion topics, transcribe them, and then send them out to the attendees for further clarification. A final version will be sent to the appropriate departments, committees, and groups as discussion points and suggestions for future examination as to their feasibility, viability, cost-effectiveness, technology, etc.

"We did not solve our enrollment and retention issues with this one meeting, on the contrary, the resolution or solution is a moving target that requires our constant adjustment and reevaluation," Vice President of Academic Affairs Mary Kay Rudolph emphasized. "What I believe we did accomplish was the beginning of a comprehensive dialogue based on shared understanding and a shared commitment to making this District viable and vital in both the immediate and long-term future."

SRJC - A Drug-free Educational Environment

Because the use of illicit drugs and alcohol disrupts classes and the work environment, compromises physical and mental health, subjects an individual to criminal penalties, and compromises the quality of the educational services we provide to our community, SRJC's policies, procedures, and labor agreements all acknowledge the importance of an educational environment free of drugs and other performance inhibiting substances. District employees are advised that:

District Policy 6.8.4 prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance while on Sonoma County Junior College property or being under the influence of a controlled substance while engaged in activities endorsed, sponsored, or supported by the District.

Any employee found in violation of the policy will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment and referral for prosecution. Disciplinary action may include completion of an appropriate rehabilitation program. Federal law requires an employee convicted of a drug violation to notify the District in writing within five days of such conviction.

Use of controlled substances can also pose many health problems. To learn more about the health risks, contact Student Health Services. The District has also arranged with Family and Community Counseling Services (545-4551) to provide information and assistance with alcohol and drug related problems through the district-sponsored Employee Assistance Program. To add Web-enhanced learning to your face-to-face classes, attend the first five sessions. To teach an entire online class, attend all nine.

February 10 - Construct basic class homepages and get your "details" link

February 24 - Add images and navigation and put your syllabus on the Web

March 3 - Create a complete week-by-week schedule of topics and assignments

March 10 - Put auto-grading tests and exercises on the Web

March 17 - Design entire class web sites with lectures, animations, audio, video, etc.

March 24 - Manage password protection, student rosters and activity logs, online collaborative work groups, etc.

March 31 - Utilize Web-based Message Boards and e-mail Lists

April 7 - Configure automated online grade books for password-protected access by students


Travel With Theatre Arts Instructors Ashland, Oregon

During Black History Month in February, SRJC will present various events, including the following documentaries:

James Baldwin: The Price of the Ticket

A documentary that captures the passionate intellect and courageous writing of a man who was born black, impoverished, gay, and gifted. The archival footage evokes the atmosphere of Baldwin's formative years, the Harlem of the 1930's, his father's fundamentalist church, and the emigre demi-monde of post-war Paris. Includes newsreel clips from the 1960's record Baldwin's running commentary on the drama of the Civil Rights Movement.

The Road to Brown: The Life of Charles Houston

Explore the life of the man whose work led to overturning segregation in public education (Brown vs. Board of Education). Houston, the first black editor of the Harvard Law Review and Dean of Howard University Law School, trained Thurgood Marshall and launched a number of precedent-setting cases that overturned Jim Crow.


Evolution Of The Blues Concert
