Library Schedules “Library Salons” On Changing Resources & Technology

“Change” is a word that everyone involved with teaching and learning are all too familiar with and the SRJC Libraries are no exception. Owing to reduced budgets and advancements in technology, there are a number of significant changes set to occur at Doyle and Mahoney Libraries that will impact students. If you are an instructor whose assignments involve research, you will want to know more about these important changes and attend one of the “library salons” that will outline what you need to know.

The Libraries have scheduled multiple sessions in February and March to provide opportunities to learn about these changes and ask questions regarding the new databases that the Libraries will offer. Librarians will work with you and your colleagues at individual workstations to provide a closer look at the new databases and search technologies. The anticipated changes can be summarized as follows:

- Effective January 1, 2011, the Literature Resource Center (LRC) has been canceled and replaced by the Gale Literary Databases (GLD). This new database combines the Contemporary Authors, Contemporary Literary Criticism Select, and the Dictionary of Literary Biography resources.
- The Expanded Academic (Infotrac) database has been canceled, effective June 2011, and will be with EBSCO California Premier Package (available now!), which provides 16 databases used at many universities and community colleges throughout the country.
- As of June 2011, the ProQuest suite of databases will be reduced to only the Northern California papers contained in the database titled ProQuest, California North Newsstand.
- See Ebsco’s new Discovery Service, an all-in-one search tool currently in development, which provides users with a single search box that delivers content from all library resources.

Rick Call - Special Recognition. Rick began his 43 year relationship with SRJC as a student-athlete from 1967 to 1969. Since 1992, Rick has served as a SRJC Board of Trustee member and currently serves as Board President. Rick is a founding member of the Hall of Fame Committee and has been involved with all but one of the 16 Hall of Fame events. Rick will be inducted by Mr. Pat Ryan.

DeeDee Baddeley - Athlete. DeeDee represents the 1980s in softball, volleyball, and basketball. A rare three-sport letter winner, she excelled especially in softball and played on a state championship team for Coach Marv Mays. DeeDee will be inducted by Ms. Chris Elze.

Steve Tiedeman - Athlete. Steve represents the 1970s as an outstanding basketball player for Coach Hank Cooper. While only playing one year for the Bear Cubs, Steve was one of the top scorers in the state. He went on to become a star at Sonoma State where he played for former Bear Cub coach Bill Trumbo. 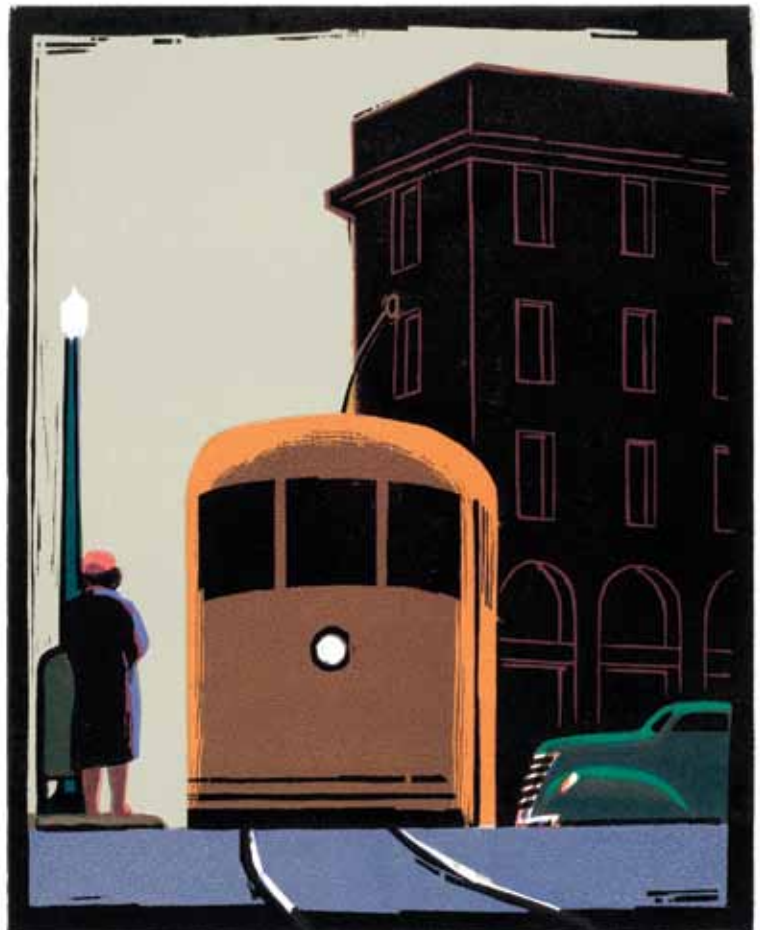


Printmaking Exhibit at Mahoney Gallery Thru Feb 2011

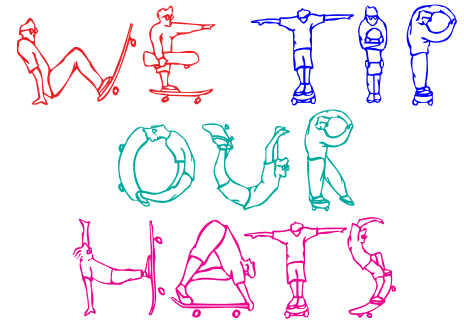
Various activities are scheduled during February commemorating Black History Month. We will try to include many in the upcoming issues of the Insider.

On behalf of the college community, we extend our deep sympathy to the family, friends, and colleagues of long-time SRJC Dive Coach **Tim Nobriga** who passed away unexpectedly on February 14 from a heart attack. This season would have been Tim's last season coaching, as he planned to retire at the end of the school year.

Tim was regarded as one of the most trusted, loyal, dependable, and caring college instructors. The strong, silent type, Tim coached SRJC divers for 37 years. Starting at SRJC as an Assistant Diving Coach in 1974, he was hired in 1977 as an Adjunct Instructor. In addition to serving as the Assistant Men's Water Polo Coach for 15 years, Tim was also an Aquatics Instructor and Head Diving Coach, producing numerous Conference Champions, All Americans, and State Champions, including SRJC Athletic Hall of Famers DeDe Fritsch, Chris Berger, and Adam Soldati. Tim was also a member of the coaching staff and qualified divers for all six SRJC Women's Swimming & Diving State Championship Title Teams ('79, '83, '04, '05, '08, and '09). He also coached local high school divers and served as the Santa Rosa City Schools District Diving Coach.

Tim is survived by his devoted wife Sue Nobriga, his brother-in-law Dennis Olson, and his nieces, nephews, and many friends throughout the community. Tim loved Disneyland and regularly visited the Magic Kingdom with his wife. In fact, his trademark jean jacket was a Disney jacket. He will be deeply missed. A memorial service is scheduled on Monday, February 21 at 11:00 AM at Daniels Chapel of the Roses on Sonoma Avenue.
