There is a \$450 deposit due with your completed application.

SRJC English Professor

Janet McCulloch

Study Abroad is about three things—taking transferrable classes, learning about world culture, and having fun. *Janet McCulloch's* philosophy of education includes the notion that enjoyment facilitates learning. *Janet* will focus on analyzing literature on location in London.

Janet McCulloch has travelled extensively in the British Isles and North and South America. She has studied literature and history in a variety of cultures and offers a wealth of knowledge about the effect of “place” on writers and their readership. Shakespeare is an area of particular expertise; she has led classes at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival in Ashland, and is looking forward to a joyous London experience.



will offer *Merry Wives of Windsor* and *Henry IV, Parts I & II*. We will visit Stratford to see a comedy and a tragedy at the Royal Shakespeare Company and see the places where Shakespeare's life began and ended. (Note: This course has successfully articulated with UC-Berkeley for the upper division requirement for Shakespeare).

English 2: Introduction to the Novel

3 units (Grade or P/NP)

AA/AS: Area E--Humanities

Transfer Credit: CSU/UC*

CSU GE Area: C2--Humanities

IGETC: 3B--Humanities

Prerequisite: Course Completion of ENGL 1A or higher with a grade of C or better

The 18th century novel evolved into a profoundly important genre in literature. British novels of the late 18th century developed into very popular entertainment. This course will explore the different kinds of novels or sub-genres including: Romance, Picaresque, Epistolary, Gothic, Novel of Manners, Historical, Roman a clef, Kunsterroman, Bildungsroman, Fantasy, Mystery, Documentary, and Modern/anti-novel. Tentative titles include: Daniel DeFoe's *Moll Flanders*, Jane Austen's *Emma*, Dorothy L. Sayers' *Gaudy Night*, one of Anthony Powell's short novels from *A Dance to the Music of Time*, and Martin Amis' *London Fields*. We will visit the settings of select novels. Visits to museums, lectures, and walking tours of historical interest, will add to the students' knowledge of the periods.

English 46.2: Survey of British Literature, Part II

3 units (Grade or P/NP)

Transfer Credit: CSU/UC*

Associate Degree: Area E: Humanities

Prerequisite: Course Completion of ENGL 1A or higher with a grade of C or better

The second part of the Survey of British Literature moves historically through the Romantic Age to the

Victorians in the 19th century, on to the 20th century Modernists, and beyond to the Post-Modernists of our own time. The course will begin with an in-depth study of the Romantic poets—Wordsworth, Shelley, Keats, Byron, and Coleridge and a weekend trip to the Lake District. The second section will focus on the Victorian Age, the rise of the novel, and the place of women in British society. The third section will concentrate on analyzing the poetry of the Modern Age with emphasis on the war poetry of Wilfred Owen and the post-WWI poetry of T.S. Eliot. Finally, we will explore the poetry and fiction of Great Britain in the 21st century and the connection between literature and film, literature and politics, and literature in the global context.

**The University of California will accept SRJC courses numbered 1-49. However, students should not count credit earned for special topics (48) or independent studies (49) towards the 60 units required for admission. The UC campus will evaluate these courses after admission.*

English 27: Introduction to Shakespeare

3 units (Grade or P/NP)
